# NAPLAN Tuesday 15th - Thursday 17th May

In May 2012 the National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) will be completed by all students in Years 3 and 5, 7 and 9 in all government and non-government schools. NAPLAN has the support of all State and Territory Education Ministers and will assess the literacy and numeracy learning of students in all Australian schools.

The results of the tests will provide important information to schools about what each student can do, and will be used to support teaching and learning programs. Parents will receive a report indicating their child's level of achievement. Each student's level of achievement will be reported against the national minimum standard.

Background information (student name, gender, date of birth, language background and Aboriginality) will be collected as part of the National Assessment Program. This information is treated confidentially and held securely to ensure that every student's right to privacy is maintained.

The tests will be conducted across Australia for all students from 15-18 May, 2012.

#### ANZAC SERVICE

On Tuesday 24<sup>th</sup> April children made wreaths of poppies to lay in remembrance at our School ANZAC Service. The service was led by our captains and senior students.

We spent the day learning about the ANZACs and why it is an important part of our culture.

As part of the day's activity we read about John Simpson and his donkey (Duffy) and made some delicious Anzac biscuits. (We hope some may have made it home to share).









Here are the recounts of this story:

Jack Simpson was a soldier in World War 1. He was born in Tyne Dock and that's where he grew up. Then he went to World War 1 and his job was to help people who got shot or had other illnesses. He helped so many people he had run out of stretchers so he found a donkey and he named him Duffy. Duffy helped Jack to help people. Jack let Duffy have a break and another donkey took over. Then on May 19th, 1913 a Turkish soldier shot him in the back and the bullet went straight through his heart and he died.

#### **ANZAC BISCUITS**

Makes 12

## Ingredients

1 cup rolled oats
1 cup plain flour
1 cup desiccated coconut
3/4 cup castor sugar
125 g butter
1 tablespoon golden syrup
1/2 teaspoon baking power
1 tablespoon boiling water



- Heat oven to 160 degrees C. Lightly grease oven trays.
- Put oats, flour, coconut, sugar in big mixing bowl.
- Melt butter and golden syrup in pan, stirring. Take off heat.
- Mix baking soda and boiling water in a cup.
- Add to melted butter in the pan.
- Quickly add to big bowl. Mix it all well.
- Roll tablespoonful lots into balls. Put on trays 5 cm apart.
- Press lightly with fork. Bake 20 minutes one tray at a time.
- Enjoy!
