Seniors Information Report

Thanks to Shane's sharp eyes we spotted 3 extra friends at school on Friday. The Tawny Frogmouth family was happily resting in the shade under the tree near the sandpit.

We decided to find out about our visitors and here is what the students discovered:

Introduction

Tawny Frogmouths are birds that can fly. They are nocturnal which means they are awake at night and asleep in the day.

They are a predator and catch their prey with their beak.

Tawny Frogmouths are not owls and are related to night jars.

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<u>Appearance</u>

The Tawny Frogmouth has silvery-grey feathers covering its body. It has a wide beak with a tuft of feathers on it. The Tawny Frogmouth has yellow eyes which stand out against its silvery-grey feathers. They are excellent at camouflaging with tree branches. The male and female look similar. They grow up to 30-35 centimetres. By Sarah

<u>Diet</u>

A Tawny Frogmouth eats lots of different types of species: like rats, mice, cicadas, beetles, frogs and other prey. They don't hunt and fly around, they just wait for their food to come to them, then they pounce on it. They don't catch their prey with their talons', they catch it with their big yellow beak.

Breeding

Tawny Frogmouths mate forever. They lay 1-3 eggs each year between August and December. They use the same nest each year which is made from sticks, twigs and leaves.

It takes the eggs 30 days to hatch. The female and male keep the eggs warm.

The babies leave their parents after about 25 days. By Seth

Tawny Frogmouths are found all over Australia. They don't like rainforests or deserts. They live in eucalyptus woodland.
