It is most important that our students continue to commemorate Anzac Day for generations to come.

NAPLAN testing will occur between the dates 15-17 May for students in Year 3 and Year 5. Students will complete language and writing tests on Tuesday 15th May, reading tests on Wednesday 16th May and numeracy tests on Thursday 17th May. Any students who miss tests will have the opportunity to catch up on Friday 18th May. Results of these tests should be available in September. Information about Naplan has been sent home with those students involved. Children are encouraged to have early nights and a good breakfast each day in order to aid concentration whilst the testing period is in progress.

Yesterday our students in Years 3 to 6 competed in the annual **Cross country** event, held in conjunction with Hay Public School. Our students competed against Booligal and SO-TA students with great success **as all have qualified** to compete at **the Deniliquin District Cross Country on June 1st.**

In the middle of 2017, we were fortunate enough to be the recipients of a **grant** from the **Carrathool Shire Council**. We used this grant to purchase new laptops. These laptops are used on a daily basis for a wide variety of lessons by our students, with research, publishing written work, maths drills and developing typing skills being most common. Having access to up-to-date technology is vital in education as it allows our students to be competitive in today's technology driven world. We thank Carrathool Shire Council for their grant .

Carrathool Public School recently purchased **new ukuleles** for our students, permanently replacing those that were hired from South West Music. 

Drum Muster

The Carrathool Shire Tip is the collection site for any 'clean' chemical drums. The drums need to be cleaned and sighted by an inspector. Once this is done, and paperwork completed, the drums can be dropped off at the collection site.

Training is available to anyone who would like to become an inspector and is free of charge.

The Carrathool P & C receive a small amount (\$0.25) per drum once they have been collected by a contractor. The site has already collected 11,249 drums to date.

Collection is usually made for 500 drums approximately 2-3 times a year. If anyone has 1,000 drums or more, collection can be made directly from the property.
