After lunch in a park in Bendigo we went to the Discovery Centre. A guide showed us all around the

Aura Show By Eliza Rawle

After spending all day at Sovereign Hill, Carrathool PS went to the Aura night show at 8.30pm. The Aura show was held at Sovereign Hill too and we had to travel through Sovereign Hill by special buses to get to each section of the show.

There were three different parts to the Aura show. The first part was probably everyone's favourite—the 3D show. The 3D show was held in a theatre and told us all about the formation of the Earth and meteors and, of course, gold. It was so cool. Meteors came shooting right at us as we sat



in our seats wearing our 3D glasses. Volcanoes erupted on us and shooting stars whizzed past our heads. We saw how gold was formed in 3D.

The second section was held outside in an ampitheatre and told us all about the Aboriginal people and their perspective on gold. It told us about the formation of the first men and women out of clay and rock and river mud by the eagle spirits and ancestors.

The final part was held both indoors (audience) and outdoors (the scene.) and depicted life on the goldfields in 1854 and the circumstances leading to the Eureka Stockade and the development of democracy in Australia. Everyone's favourite bit was when the miners burnt the Eureka Hotel down. This happened because the miner Scobie was drunk and the hotel owner, Bentley, wouldn't let him in. From diary entries and other information such as



an 11 year old boy's eye witness account, we think Bentley murdered Scobie by hitting him with a shovel. Bentley got off the murder charge and so the other miners burnt down the hotel. The miners were fed up with the mean troopers and police, poor living conditions, the expensive licences and Bentley being let off. All these things contributed to the beginning of the Eureka Stockade and democracy for all Australians, not just the rich.
